Terry FitzPatrick is director of the Alliance to End Slavery and Trafficking (ATEST), a broad-based, nonpartisan coalition that advocates for lasting solutions to prevent forced labor and human trafficking, hold perpetrators accountable, ensure justice for victims and empower survivors with tools for recovery. FitzPatrick serves as ATEST's principal policy analyst and representative with Congress, the White House, federal agencies, multilateral institutions, the news media and allied organizations in the anti-trafficking movement.

Before joining ATEST, FitzPatrick served as communications and advocacy director for Free the Slaves, where he managed the international Freedom from Slavery Forum and represented civil society organizations on the Global Coordinating Group of United Nations Alliance 8.7. He partnered with survivor leaders and front-line activists to produce short films on anti-trafficking successes in 14 countries.

A journalist by training, FitzPatrick's news reports and documentaries have been carried by NPR, PBS, CNN, BBC, France 24, The Guardian, Huffington Post, Dallas Morning News, Texas Observer, Discovery Channel, History Channel and Fox. He has conducted television, radio, newspaper, internet and organizational communications training projects for journalists, corporate executives, public officials and nonprofit communications officers throughout Asia, Africa and Eastern Europe. FitzPatrick studied journalism at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and has won numerous communications awards.
